REFLECTION - WHO IS MY NEIGHBOR?

(Luke 10:25-37)

This passage relates the conversation between Jesus and a lawyer who longed for eternal life. He asked Jesus what he should do, to get eternal life. Jesus told him a series of things to be done and ends the conversation by telling him to love the neighbor as he loves himself. And the man asks Jesus "who is my neighbor?" Jesus responded to the question by giving him the parable of the good Samaritan. A man was on his way from Jerusalem, he was attacked and beaten to death by thieves and abandoned on the way. The Levite and the priest, the Levite and the priest, the religious leaders, the most knowledgeable of the law saw him but did not assist, they passed by. But a Samaritan, someone who was not considered by the society of the time saw the man and took care of him.

In telling the parable, Jesus was saying that to love your neighbor is to care for his/her needs. The Samaritan attended to the wounded and vulnerable man. In doing so, he acted to restore the man. To follow Jesus is to love our neighbor as ourselves. This means attending to their needs. Attending to the needs of those who are vulnerable is helping to restore them and their dignity.

When civilians, inoffensive people, are attacked by those who are heavily armed, aren't they vulnerable? When people are without shelter, without food, without medicine aren't they vulnerable? This is the case for the Congolese in Eastern Congo who live in Internal Displaced camps where there is no clean water, children do not go to school, access to food is difficult, aren't they vulnerable? Who is the neighbor to Congolese people in Eastern Congo? Vis-à-vis to the suffering situation of the Congolese

people in Eastern Congo what kind of behave are you going to exhibit? That of the Levite and the priest or that of the Samaritan? God bless you!
